Along those lines, Mark adds, "I like 'default rules' for auctions we've not discussed." His examples of "default rules" include:

- All strange bids are forcing ("ASBAF"),
- All undiscussed bids are as natural as possible, and
- When in doubt, choose the least risky bid.

Facts About Bridge, Adapted from Table Talk

For 16 years Mark Oettinger and Ingi Agnarsson wrote a column for the BBC website titled "Table Talk." In their penultimate issue (April of 2021) they listed some facts about duplicate bridge. We have updated that article and repeat some of the information here.

Our national organization, the ACBL, is nearly 90 years old, has more than 130,000 members, and sanctions more than 3.5 million tables of duplicate bridge annually in more than 2,500 clubs and tournaments. It also sanctions about a million tables online each year.

ACBL's national headquarters are in Horn Lake, MS, a suburb of Memphis, TN. It has a budget of more than \$16 million, employs 48 full-time staff, and has 129 tournament directors for its national, regional, and sectional tournaments.

Each of its three annual North American Bridge Championships attract up to 6,500 players, and its regional and sectional tournaments attract many thousands more.

Like all Vermont bridge clubs, the BBC is in Unit 175. The Unit, in turn, is part of District 25, which comprises clubs in all six New England states. Districts run regional tournaments, and Units run sectionals.

As you know, ACBL publishes the monthly *Bridge Bulletin*, which is an exclusive benefit for ACBL members and the best bridge magazine for players at all levels. Some would say the *Bulletin* alone is worth the cost of membership.
